Dear Friends,

During Blawenburg Church's last Consistory meeting, a very intriguing phrase emerged: *growth strategy*. Assessing where we are and envisioning where we want to go requires us to think and pray a lot about this. What is our church's "growth strategy?" I recognize bantering around words like this in church can make us uncomfortable. Especially, when talk of growth becomes code for simply raising more money, we are right to be suspicious. However, I suggest to you that every thriving church today, every church that is a vital, worshipping, serving, loving community, whether mainline, nondenominational, Catholic, or Pentecostal, has some understanding of their "growth strategy." They ask themselves questions like:

"Who are we specifically trying to reach in our community?"

"What specific challenges and needs are those we are trying to reach facing in their daily lives?"

"How can we establish relationship with them, build trust, and offer responses to their needs in faithful and attractive ways?"

Having a growth strategy is not simply about marketing—it is about mission. Every thriving church has a clear mission, a clear mission that flows from a compelling vision of the gospel. That is great for other churches, you might be thinking, but what about us? Where do we begin? Join me this year in asking ourselves these questions, not just during one meeting, but over and over again, asking God to open us up to the gifts of wisdom and compassion. Consider your every day life in our surrounding community as a chance to do "field work" in better understanding what people are going through. Take notes. Carry their needs in your heart. Pray for them in worship. This Lent reflect with me on the spiritual health of our own lives. Where do we need healing? Is there pain or alienation experienced previously in our church community that still needs tending and reconciliation? On the Christian journey, health precedes mission. We must go inward to look outward well. Even as I hope we keep our eyes wide open to the needs of those around us, cultivating this inward journey and relational health is my primary aim as your pastor this year.

 - “Children's Sermon Every Sunday” sign will be added to the main sign out in front of the sanctuary. M/S/P – All in favor
- b. **Missions** – Barbara Pavlicek (See Mission Team section in this newsletter.)
 - We will receive an Ark certificate from Heifer International for our \$5,000+ donation raised from Sinterklaas through Epiphany.
 - Cooking event with Crawford House residents was successful and delicious.
 - M/S/P: All in favor . . . to move our RCA Missionary Support from Chiapas, Mexico, to Ken and Marcia Bradsell in Oman for three years.
- c. **Properties** – Ethel Terhune
 - Our tenant in M.H. Warehouse, A Step in Stone, intends to move by March 1. Gracie Johnson will take care of the issue of security deposit and 90-day notice. The tenant will be notified of our concern of the location of the dumpster and the possibility of restricting parking and doing damage to the lawn. Jean will ask Consistory what their desire is for the next rental and recommend a long-term rental for financial reasons. The committee was not happy with previous realtor.
 - When the present contract runs out, we will look for a cheaper carrier than Waste Management.
 - A Building Use Application Form is completed and will be taken to Consistory.
 - The Riso copy machine in the file room will be removed.
 - Bernice and Ethel sorted books in the library.
 - Sorting old files is an ongoing mission.
 - Gutters will be cleaned in the spring.
 - BVS director reported mice in the nursery school basement. Ethel will check into this.
 - One snow plowing has been paid for.
 - Inquiry has been made to rent the green room in M.H. Gracie will research pricing per square foot. If rented, the men's bathroom would become a unisex bathroom.
 - Next month the Properties Team will evaluate work needed to be done in Mem. Hall.

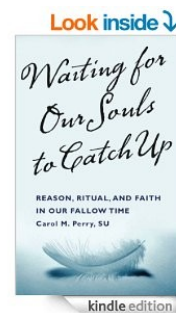

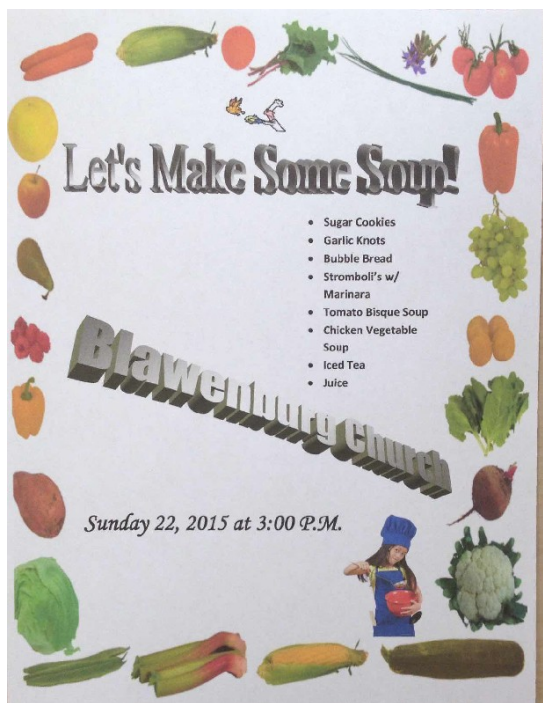
On Sunday, February 22, twenty women from Crawford House spent the afternoon in the kitchen of Cook Hall. With instruction from Evelyn Cochran and Nancy Curtis, they prepared two types of soup (chicken and tomato basil), salad complete with homemade dressing, stromboli, garlic knots and sugar cookies and monkey bread for dessert.

It became immediately evident that the communal environment in which these women live is successful. Their ability to work together was apparent and awfully inspirational. Because of their efficiency, dinner was prepared in just over an hour. Once the meal was finished, the women had the kitchen restored in record time.

A number of church members assisted in the event. Dave Cochran drove the van to get the women to and from the church. He, Barb Pavlicek and Alan Taback joined the ladies to socialize over dinner, and Chip Parmele stopped in to visit as the meal was being prepared.

The women of Crawford House were able to offer as much to us as we were to them. The thought was to teach twenty ladies how to make soup, salad, and dessert in such a way that was simple and economical. However, they reciprocated by indicating that both hope and renewal are possible. It was such a gratifying experience, both for the Crawford House women as well as the people of our church.

Our Former Pastor, Now a Missionary!

[Editorial Note: On February 23, 2015 Consistory voted to move our global missionary support from the Chiapas, Mexico Mission to Ken and Marcia Bradsell who are starting their missionary work in Oman. Our missionaries in Chiapas are retiring in June (see page 12 for their letter). Below is an email from Ken to his brother, Bob Bradsell and sister-in-law Barb, who have recently adopted a pair of kittens.]

It's a good thing Marcia remembers to communicate. I tend to get immersed in work stuff.

We are finding our way around Oman, at least around the Muscat area which is the sprawling capital district with almost half of the country's population. I made a trip up to Nizwa, the old capital for the interior region of the country prior to Oman being fully unified from its tribal past (with a little help from a British bombing run that drove out the hold out Imam in the 1950s). Marcia didn't go along. We trekked around the old fort (now restored as a museum) and a local Imam took us on a walking tour of some of the oldest Mosques in the region (in one, which was about 700 years old) the prayer wall originally faced Bethlehem rather than Mecca.

Our Protestant Church in Oman congregations (1 Arabic and 4 English language) here in Muscat are worshipping 800-1000 weekly and we provide worship space for an additional 79 Christian groups who have their own pastors and schedule time throughout the days and evenings of the week. It is illegal for worship to take place away from worship settings (e.g. no house worship is permitted) so the campuses provided by the Department of Religious Affairs are the only option for the multitude and variety of Christian churches from around the world. One of our responsibilities is to authorize these groups, approve work visas for their pastors, and schedule space and time for them in our facilities.

We'll be back in NYC for a couple of days in March. We fly from Muscat to NYC via Frankfurt on my birthday. Crossing 9 time zones makes for interesting jet lag! I have a meeting in my former office in Manhattan. I am preaching and leading an adult forum at our former church in Ridgewood and meeting with the Easter Offering committee at Marble (all in hopes of getting some additional mission support for the work here). We then, head back to Oman via Zurich so I can lead worship here.
