Digitizing Our Past

It was so nice to visit with long-time member Mike Vande Woude (now living in Virginia) on September 25th. Mike had been at a meeting at New Brunswick Theological Seminary of the New Netherlands Institute. The meeting included many Dutch Historical Societies from across the country and also included participants from Leiden and Amsterdam Universities in Holland. Mike had specific conversations with the RCA Historian and Archivist. Mike has arranged to have our church's historical records digitized and preserved. He volunteered our church as a pilot for this project before it goes nationwide to digitize the records of all of the Dutch history of the Reformed Church in America. The preservation of our records had always been a concern for Tom Skillman and Grace Terhune. They would be pleased that this will begin to happen. It is no surprise, then, that Peggy Querec (daughter of Grace) volunteered to help organize this effort. More help will be needed from the congregation. A Farewell from Rev. Ken Bradsell

Dear friends and partners in ministry,
“Peace be to the whole community, and love with faith, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Grace be with all who have an undying love for our Lord Jesus Christ.”



It is with a measure of deep sadness that I write this letter. I will be returning to Oman on September 13 following months of providing support and care for my wife, Marcia, as she continues on the road to recovery from her major heart attack on June 12. The heart attack occurred while we were traveling to our USA home in Maine after a full week of church visits, teaching and preaching in New York and New Jersey. Marcia spent nine days in cardiac intensive care in Connecticut before she was well enough to be transported the six hours to our Maine home and transferred to the care of cardiologists in Portland. Her recovery has been positive. However, she faces additional surgery this fall and a long road to recovery. She is unable to return to Oman.

For this reason, I have been in conversation with both the Rev. Doug Leonard, RCA Director of Global Mission, and the Rev. Dr. Duncan Hanson, supervisor of the RCA’s personnel in the Middle East and Europe. Together we have agreed that it is time for my service with the Protestant Church in Oman to end so I can give my full attention and support to Marcia in the coming months and years.

Our two sons will provide interim care for Marcia so I can return to Oman briefly. I will be concluding my service with the congregations in Muscat on Friday, October 7 so I am able to be back in the USA for Marcia’s continuing care.

Our intent when we answered the call to serve in Oman in 2014 was to remain for not less than three, and we had hoped five years. That is no longer possible. I have been assured by Rev. Dr. Hanson and Rev. Leonard that they are seeking an RCA pastor who will join the pastoral team in a matter of months.

Many of you began your support for the ministry in Oman during my all-to-brief ministry with the Protestant Church there. The ministry continues and is as vibrant as ever with over 1000 in attendance weekly, a full range of programs for adults, children, and youth, and mission outreach around the world. The RCA began this work 125 years ago. I hope and pray you will continue to support it in the months and years ahead.

Time to Fill Boxes!

Our November Mission Focus is OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD. If you are filling a shoe box individually or with your family, please return filled box by Sunday, November 13. The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to needy children around the world at Christmas and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. This mission of Rev. Franklin Graham's Samaritan's Purse always comes early! These shoe box gifts reach children ages 2-14 in countries suffering from natural disasters, wars and endemic poverty. The boxes are fun to fill by yourself or with your children. You can find lots of fun and useful things in dollar stores. For ideas of what, and what not, to pack into your shoe box, see items listed here or go to www.samaritanpurse.org, where you can also print out an insert form that will allow you to track your package to its destination. Flat, scored, decorated boxes are available and do not have to be wrapped; all you need to do is fold and fill! Then secure the lid with a rubber band only. Packing ideas and insert forms will be available later this month. We will sort and pack boxes on Sunday, November 13th to be delivered the following week. The Mission Team hopes you can support this outreach effort by packing a shoe box or two or by buying bulk items for several shoe boxes and then by joining us at coffee hour on November 13th .

GIFT IDEAS

TOYS - small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch®, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky®, etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES - pens, pencils and manual sharpener, crayons or markers, rubber stamps and ink pad sets, small writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS - toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, wash cloth, etc.

Frozen Soups - A note from the soup guy: It's that time of the year again when we will be building up our soup supply. Soup sales have been a big hit at previous Sinterklaas events and we would like to continue the tradition this year. We are looking for at least 150 containers of soup (in pints and quarts). The good news is that if many of us fill just a few containers, we will reach our goal. The process is straightforward.

1. Find your favorite recipe.
2. Get soup containers in the basement of Cook Hall. We have pint containers now and quarts plus more lids should arrive by mid-October. We have both pints and quarts to accommodate different quantity needs.
3. Make the soup at your convenience.
4. IMPORTANT: Tape a label on the LID of the soup container that lists the name of the soup and its ingredients.
5. Put the soup in the freezer in the kitchen of Cook Hall anytime. Be sure to print your name and the name and quantities of your soups in the blue folder near the freezer.

Arthur Tappen Brown, 94, of Belle Mead, peacefully passed away Monday, September 26, 2016. He was born December 11, 1921 to Dr. Lewis Nathan Brown and Alice Moench Brown.
